In ‘The Last Lantern,’ the empty harbor first makes belonging seem like a place a person must earn. Mara arrives after every shop has closed, and the narrator says, ‘Every window was dark except the one nobody owned.’ That unclaimed light mirrors Mara: she is present, but no household or neighborhood has claimed her. The setting therefore begins as evidence of exclusion rather than comfort.

The abandoned lighthouse changes that idea. Mara repairs its broken lens even though no one asks her to. When the fishing boats return through fog, the story says, ‘The lantern kept its promise even after the keeper forgot his.’ The promise belongs to the light, but Mara chooses to keep it. By acting for people who do not yet know her, she creates a relationship before she receives recognition.

At the end, the harbor is still physically cold and weathered, yet the windows open one by one as neighbors walk toward the tower. That shift shows the theme: belonging is not merely being invited into an existing place. It can begin when someone takes responsibility for the well-being of others. Mara does not wait for the town to name her as one of them; her choice to restore the light makes the town see that she already is. The setting develops from darkness, to a single shared signal, to many open windows, turning Mara’s private act into a community’s recognition.

Reply 1: I agree that the lighthouse becomes more than a setting, especially when you connect its repair to Mara’s choice. Your claim that belonging can be created through responsibility helped me notice the open windows differently. I would add that the neighbors move toward her only after the boats are safe; their welcome depends on seeing what she has done. Does that make their belonging conditional, or does it show that communities sometimes need an action before they recognize a person’s character?

Question: How does density affect the order of water, vegetable oil, and dish soap in a column?

Method: I poured 30 mL of each liquid into a clear cup, waited two minutes, and recorded the layer order and height. I repeated the procedure three times.

Trial 1 — soap 2.1 cm / water 2.0 cm / oil 2.2 cm — soap, water, oil

Trial 2 — soap 2.0 cm / water 2.1 cm / oil 2.1 cm — soap, water, oil

Trial 3 — soap 2.2 cm / water 2.0 cm / oil 2.0 cm — soap, water, oil

Conclusion: The liquids formed the same order in all three trials: dish soap at the bottom, water in the middle, and oil on top. The repeated pattern supports the claim that the densest liquid sinks while the least dense liquid floats. Dish soap had the greatest density, followed by water and then vegetable oil. Small changes in layer height may have come from liquid remaining in the measuring cup or bubbles in the soap.
